We have finalized our 2024-2026 Strategic Plan, transitioned Executive Leadership, launched a renewed Fall membership drive, and expanded public education and communications. Wew Pioneers for a Sustainable Future is a non-profit organization promoting sustainability in rural, central Kentucky. Since New Pioneers' founding in 2005 by Sr. Claire McGowan, our vision has been to build and foster a sustainability movement throughout our region and state.

Our Why

We believe that living sustainably is the key to a healthy future for all: Ourselves, our communities, and generations to come. To live sustainably, we must respect the environmental limits of our natural world and embrace social equity and economic vitality to create thriving and resilient communities.

New Pioneers promotes sustainability in rural, central Kentucky because we know that inspiring individuals to connect with the world around them motivates us all to embrace sustainable lifestyles already embodied within our communities.

What We Do

To meet our mission, New Pioneers strives to do the following:

- Educate local communities through a variety of programs, resources, and communications;
- Demonstrate sustainable living practices alongside our network of members; and
- Advocate for strategies to support healthy ecosystems, locally and globally.

While our efforts are focused in Nelson, Marion, and Washington counties, the ripple effects of our efforts often reach even further.

How We Impact

As a community-based nonprofit, we see our work come alive through community engagement. We achieve this by hosting independent environmental education programs, partnering with local community partners to represent the voice of sustainability at community events, and by building local connections to advance our mission and work. We rely on the support of our member network, specifically, to fund and fuel our ongoing growth.

Education Highlights

Our mission came to life through many educational initiatives this year; centering around building connections to the natural world and inspiring sustainable actions.

We were thrilled to offer our annual **Springfield Green Festival**, which engaged 400 community members and grew to include some new faces and stations to engage community members young and older. This Summer, New Pioneers hosted our second annual **Space Night**, in which we "took to the skies" with over 100 attendees to observe the Persied Meteor Shower. We also co-led nature explorations


during the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth's "Spirit of the Wild" day camp for local youth. Finally, New Pioneers launched a "Winter Nature Series" in partnership with the three local libraries in our tri-county region, offering a "Storytime Takeover" with the Washington County Public Library and a "Web of Life: Nature Homeschool Afternoon" program with the Nelson County Public Library, serving twenty five (25) youth total. We were also proud to represent sustainability at Springfield's Sorghum Festival, the Loretto Motherhouse "Ag Bash", and Springfield's Downtown Trick or Treat."

Demonstration Highlights

we Pioneers' mission guides us to demonstrate sustainable lifestyles for our community, and we were thrilled to **strengthen and build relationships** with key community partners such as the City of Springfield, Springfield Tourism, the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth, the Sisters of Loretto, and the Dominican Sisters of Peace this year. We also built connections between our Members and friends at this year's **Empty Bowl Supper**, our annual fundraiser designed to connect, inspire, and uplift local artists and voices.



We also found new ways to **engage local business partners** and industries this year by including local business outreach in our Fall membership drive and building connections with business and industry leaders, including Heaven Hill and Diageo Distilleries, as we bridge our vision for a healthy future into the work of our communities.



In addition, we've built a renewed **public** engagement strategy this year, including a social media strategy to guide our online presence and community relevance with goals to connect, educate, advocate, and inspire. We've also inaugurated the release of a seasonal newsletter, Seasons of Sustainability, to keep our following engaged and up-to-date on our work and growth.

And finally in 2023 we also wrapped up our oral history project: **"Upstream Downstream"** with the support of the Kentucky Oral History Commission. We collected twenty two interviews from local community members recounting informative and entertaining stories of their experiences growing up in the Beech Fork Watershed.

Advocacy Highlights

Our organization has a rich history of advocating for environmental conservation, and our strategic planning process this year has reinforced our community's desire for New Pioneers to embody the role of a local environmental advocate. As the sole organization doing so in our region, it is our hope to both **directly**

leverage our organizational presence and mobilize and uplift our network to advocate for the issues that will ensure a healthy. future for all.

This year, New Pioneers remained engaged in the **Save Bernheim Now Coalition** to stop construction of the proposed LG&E gas pipeline as one of the few local organizations participating in the Coalition's steering committee. New Pioneers also continued to support **Kentuckians for Energy Democracy** and the **Kentucky Conservation Committee** this





